h.1 EXPANDING PATHWAYS

- John Mullins, Superintendent of Education, and the Student Success team presented an update on recent Student Success data and initiatives including:
 - Graduation rates DCDSB continues to be one of the leaders in the province with a 4-year graduation success rate of 89% and a five-year rate of 92%
 - Student Success initiatives:
 - Dual Credit Program a student success program that helps students achieve their OSSD and gives them direct exposure to the college and apprenticeship pathway. In a dual credit course, students earn both a high school and college credit.
 - Specialist High Skills Major Program students in grade 11 and 12 focus their education on one of the 19 'economic sectors'. Students complete a number of required courses related to their sector, earn industry-related certifications, complete a Cooperative Education course and participate in reach-ahead activities with community partners.
 - Cooperative Education Program is a student success initiative funded by the Ministry of Education that provides all students with an opportunity to earn secondary school credits while participating in a work placement. Students can count two cooperative education credits as compulsory credits towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).
 - Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Programs allows students in Grades 11 and 12 to gain training through a cooperative education course in an apprenticeship trade of interest as a potential career.
 - Pathways and Exit Surveys
- Chair Rinella and Trustee Forster thanked Superintendent Mullins and Student Success Coordinators Stephen Hughes and Claudine Longo for their presentation.

- Reflecting on this past year, Director O'Brien said she looks back fondly at the many opportunities we had to celebrate throughout the year, most recently at the 50th Anniversary Family Picnic on June 2. She said it was an incredible day of prayer, community, celebration, entertainment and laughter for all ages. She thanked the planning committee and the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee for their sponsorship. She also extended her thanks to all individuals and groups who volunteered and contributed to the day, including Father Keith Wallace, Deacon Dominic Pullano, Knights of Columbus, All Our Relations Métis Drum Circle, secondary students and staff, Continuing Education, Indigenous Advisory Circle and the St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School choir.

Item I.1 Coordinator's Report – M. Meraw

On May 14, the Student Services Coordinators had their annual celebration with the Program Support Teachers. Lisa Coghlan and the Oshawa Family of Schools planned a fun and engaging day. The morning was spent at the Abilities Centre where everyone participated in a tour of the facility, a presentation on Inclusion, and engaged in Adaptive Sports including wheelchair basketball and sledge hockey. After lunch, Mass was celebrated with Fr. Keith Wallace and everyone played some more adaptive games. It was a great day where staff celebrated the Joy of Inclusion.

Today was the final PST meeting for this school year. This was another celebratory day as Student Services welcomed Francesca Mosier as the Student Services Coordinator and Teresa Ezquerra as the Student Services Consultant for the upcoming school year and bid farewell to several retirees.

Student Services Coordinators will wrap up another successful year with the final PST mentoring session on June 11. This program has proven to be very valuable for the mentees as they continue to develop their skills and knowledge as a Program Support Teacher.

Autism Update:

The last session of Registered Behaviour Technician (RBT) training is finishing up next week. The pilot will not be renewed for the Fall. PSTs who have had EAs in the training program will be inserviced on how to use the principles of ABA in their students' IEPs.

After School Skills Development Program:

Student Services is offering a summer program for PEERS at Pereyma on Wednesday nights for students in Grades 7-12 through the months of July and August, through Continuing Education.

<u>Item I.2</u> <u>Mental Health Report – D. Mullane</u>

Student Services is in the process of finalizing the Guide to Supporting Students who Self-Injure, and they hope to share this information in the fall with all educators. This month, they are working on the Ministry deliverables, including a Board Scan and the annual Action Plan.

Student Services will be hosting two Mental Health First Aid sessions this summer - July 3-4 and August 27-28. All staff, including new hires, are being invited to attend. These sessions are also being opened up to community partners through the Durham Children and Youth Planning Network (DCYPN). In the first week of July, Diane Mullane will be presenting a workshop at the Canadian Association of School System Administrators Conference on Engaging Youth in Anti-Stigma Activities.

<u>Item I.2</u> <u>Mental Health Report – D. Mullane (cont'd)</u>

Working alongside our community partners on the DCYPN Youth Suicide Prevention Action Group, Student Services has developed some suicide prevention and postvention resources, including a wallet card and postcard focused on prevention and a community postvention protocol. These resources will be available for download on the DCYPN website (electronic copies of these documents will be forwarded).

As of this fall, School Mental Health Ontario (formerly SMH-ASSIST) will be launching their new website. The new site will include sections for parents and for students, in addition to educators and school leaders. There will be online learning available for teachers and school leaders. Student Services looks forward to promoting and supporting the roll-out of this material in the fall.

<u>Item I.3</u> <u>Superintendent's Report - J. Bowyer</u>

Superintendent Bowyer thanked the members of SEAC for their support over the past year. She noted that it was another great year for SEAC and shared how appreciative the Board was of what SEAC accomplished this year and looked forward to continuing to grow the presence of our SEAC in the coming year.

Superintendent Bowyer also thanked the staff members from Student Services who have supported the work of SEAC – for being at the meetings every month to act as a Resource when needed and to the members of the Student Services executive who organized and ran events that were sponsored by SEAC.

Superintendent Bowyer also thanked the Union and Association representatives – Lyn Wardle and Paula Sorhaitz for the Durham Catholic Principals Association, Kathy McCarthy and Brooke Larson for APSSP, Maureen Cope for CUPE and Kim Boyer from OECTA elementary.

Superintendent Bowyer advised that the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services has appointed a twenty member panel to look at the proposed model for Autism support in the province of Ontario. She advised that Director Anne O'Brien will be representing Education on this panel.

Superintendent Bowyer announced that the Student Services department had two significant retirements this year. Student Services Coordinator Lisa Coghlan and Special Education Consultant Michelle Meraw. Superintendent Bowyer thanked both Lisa and Michelle for their many dedicated years of service to the Board in general and special education specifically. Superintendent Bowyer noted that Michelle Meraw is a pillar for special education in Durham Catholic. Everyone in the community knows her and values the work that she has done on behalf of the Board. At the PST meeting today, Michelle and Lisa received a standing ovation.

Superintendent Bowyer congratulated Teresa Ezquerra (currently a Student Services Coordinator) as the new Student Services consultant and Francesca Mosier, PST at St. Patrick CS, as the new Coordinator of Student Services.

Superintendent Bowyer shared that usually by this time of the year, Michelle Meraw would have submitted the SEAC PRO-Grant proposal for next year. Superintendent Bowyer noted that the month of June brings a close to the 50th Anniversary year of the Board. Last Sunday DCDSB had a Family Picnic at Lakeview Park in Oshawa that began with an outdoor mass celebrated by Father Keith Wallace from St. Bernadette Parish in Ajax. DCDSB also had the book launch of the book People of the Beatitudes which is the history of Catholic education in the Region of Durham.

And finally, Superintendent Bowyer shared slides from the Ministry of Education Special Education Branch that detailed the number of students in the province supported in special education programs. She also highlighted the number of these students that had received an IPRC and those that had not. This data indicated that last school year was the first year that the number of students in special education programs without an IPRC (52%) was more than the number of students in special education programs with an IPRC (48%). I.1 Coordinator's Report – C. Plouffe

Principals and Program Support Teachers gathered today (Sept. 10) for the first meeting of the year. School teams were given the opportunity to plan and set goals for the year. Student Services staff provided information and reminders about Student Services procedures and programs. Highlights include information on Autism and Mental Health.

AUTISM

- Funding for the social skills after school program has been renewed for the next three years. PEERS and Friendship Lab registrations have been sent out for classes beginning on September 24th.
- 15 after school courses for ABA have been added to the Sharing of Excellence workshop series, offered by members of DCART. The courses include certificates workshops as well as targeted learning for all educators.
- Functional Training for ABA will resume this year for educators who are involved with DCART and BRT. 5 sessions are provided to 3 members of each school team. Data collection and analysis, BMS and Functions are Behaviour are key topics.

I.2 Mental Health Report – D. Mullane

Over the summer, Student Services provided two sessions of Mental Health First Aid for board staff and community members.

On the August PD day, DCDSB's Staff Wellness committee created a presentation for all staff which included a video that was done by OECTA, featuring Clara Hughes. Feedback was very positive, and staff seemed to appreciate the intentional focus on their well-being at the start of the new school year.

At the PST/Principal meeting today, Student Services shared a **Pathways for Mental Health and Addictions Services** resource to be shared and distributed to all staff at their next staff meeting. The purpose of this card is to help all staff understand their role in promoting student well-being, to build awareness of pathways to care, and help educators recognize when a student might be struggling, and when and how to seek additional support.

Today (September 10) is World Suicide Prevention Day, an opportunity for everyone in the community to join together to promote understanding about suicide and highlight effective prevention activities. DCDSB is once again recruiting schools for the TAMI Intermediate classroom program. Nine schools will be selected and Intermediate staff will attend a teacher training session on October 3.

Student Services continues to run the Roots of Empathy program in several schools and have asked ROE for additional training spots this year to expand the number of schools where it can be offered. Their funding has been substantially reduced, so they are in the process of determining how many spots each board can have.

Finally, Diane Mullane will be meeting with DCPIC this week to share some ideas for capacity building related to mental health for parents. Parent engagement is an important component of DCDSB's strategic plan and it makes sense for Student Services and DCPIC to work together on this.

I.3 Superintendent's Report – J. Bowyer

Superintendent Bowyer welcomed back all of the returning SEAC members and the members of the audience. She shared the names of the new staff members in Student Services. Student Services has not heard whether or not the SEAC Pro-Grant will be released for the 2019-2020 school year yet, but are prepared to offer a Pathways to the Future event on November 5, 2019 regardless. Student Services also has plans to offer smaller, more localized and intimate parent sessions, many of which can be done without the SEAC Pro-grant. Student Services will put forward a Pro-Grant should the opportunity arise.

Staffing Changes-Francesca Mosier - Coordinator of Ajax/Pickering Colleen Plouffe - Coordinator of Oshawa/Whitby

Teresa Ezquerra - Consultant for Student Services Helen Killoran - Consultant

Transitioning to Post-Secondary Pathways graphic organizer - at today's PST meeting, Student Services handed out a placemat for Program Support teachers to use for conversations with parents about possible program pathways for students with Individual Education Plans. It is the expectation that team meetings be used, in part, to discuss pathway opportunities for students based on their strengths and interests. This graphic organizer is a simple representation of the four program pathways that students can be on in secondary school. All pathways lead to the workplace.

As part of the Board's math strategy, next week release time will be provided to the secondary schools to enable Grade 9 Applied Math teachers to meet with the Psych Services staff member for the school to review any Psych assessments that may exist for students in their class. This will be done with parent permission. This is the third year of organizing this support and it has been very well received by all involved. The psych services staff member is really able to help the subject teacher understand the strengths and areas of need for each of the students - helping the teacher to really develop a better Learning Profile for each student.

At the beginning of the school year, Student Students always reviews the Student Protection procedures. This year, they are also reviewing the Durham School Boards and Children's Aid Societies Protocol. The Board always want to make sure that all employees are well aware of their requirements under the Student Protection Act.

Grandview Children's Centre - C. Nosseir

Ontario Autism Program (OAP):

An Autism Services Fall Update Flyer for the programs and services available to purchase with Government provided OAP Childhood budgets, benefits or personal income was circulated to over 2000 Grandview families.

The Ministry of Children Community and Social Services (MCCSS) announced at the end of July that another 6 month extension would be provided to those clients currently with an active Ontario Autism Program Behaviour Plan (considered "in service"). Grandview has 143 families for whom this applies and they need to assign staff to provide therapy for the additional 6 months. While the July announcement was received as good news it did create a work force allocation issue for Grandview regarding the availability of staff to support the new Fee for Service programs for families who must access services by using their Childhood Budget dollars.

These are families coming off the wait list. In essence, there are 2 separate and distinct autism programs running in the province and providers are reluctant to "staff up" to run 2 programs when 1 of them disappears in April 2020 as only the fee for service option will remain. To make this even more challenging, another advisory council is making recommendations to government about applying needs based factor to the program which could result in fairly significant operating guideline changes for services again. Grandview is doing its best to balance the needs of children, youth and their families and fair practices for their staff. A number of other Children's Treatment Centres in Ontario have issued lay off notices to their staff as the fee for service operations of the future are very unpredictable. New Satellite location for Grandview at Paul Dwyer High School:

The construction of the Grandview Satellite at Paul Dwyer High School continues to proceed as planned. It is anticipated that services will begin in this new 6,000 square foot Satellite location in October. Grandview will gain access to the space in mid to late September. The location was needed to provide some relief to the overcrowding at the Oshawa headquarters. When Grandview's new facility opens in Ajax (2023/24 fiscal year) this Oshawa satellite will remain in place to support East Durham families. This location brings the current number of Grandview locations to 7 (Oshawa headquarters, Oshawa Paul Dwyer, Abilities Centre- adolescent program, Whitby Mall location, Ajax Westney Road location, Port Perry S.A. Cawker location and Bowmanville Knox location). The location is in partnership with Durham Catholic District School Board.

Ontario Health Team Submission:

Grandview is working with a number of other Durham organizations in the submission of a phase 2 Ontario Health team application. The Durham Ontario Health Team was invited to proceed with phase 2 after an initial submission indicating the opportunities in Durham to organize care across the continuum in Durham. Grandview's participation pertains to working to better support Children and Youth living with medical complexity across their care needs in hospital, home and community. The need for a Paediatric Complex Care Program in Durham has been advocated for and a priority of Grandview on behalf of those Grandview has served since 2015. Since that time there have been windows of opportunity with the LHIN that did not materialize and Grandview looks to the Ontario Health Teams opportunity with hope.

New Grandview:

The Federal Government completed the funding required to move into the next phase of getting Grandview's new 128,000 square foot, 6 story facility built in Ajax (on land donated by the Town of Ajax). The Federal Government provided 17.5 million dollars and that was added to the 31 million from the province and ongoing fundraising. Grandview is at 15 million of their 20 million dollar campaign. Grandview kids are fortunate to live in a region with such caring people helping to make this dream a reality.

Several of the Voice families who have children with moderate hearing loss who had previously been denied for the Child Tax Credit have recently reported that they have suddenly received retroactive payment as qualified for the child tax credit. VOICE is not sure why this has happened but it is a good result for those families.

Voice is also happy to report that they are forging a stronger working relationship with the Canadian Hearing Society and believe this will help smooth the transition of families when their children transition to adult services.

Rationale

All school Boards in the Province of Ontario must demonstrate compliance with direction from the Ministry of Education regarding class size.

Elementary Panel (Junior Kindergarten to Grade 8 – as of September 9, 2019)

In accordance with the *Ontario Education Act*, Regulations and Program Policy Memorandum, each Board of Education must demonstrate annual compliance on a date no later than September 30th with the following class size regulations:

To: Board of Trustees

Re: Class Size Compliance and Staffing Update-2019-2020

Date: September 23, 2019

Junior and Senior Kindergarten

- Average class size must be determined (total number of JK and SK students divided by total number of classes) and submitted.
- The system wide class size average for JK/SK must not exceed 26 students.
- There is a class size cap mandated by the Ministry of Education for Boards whose class size consists only of pupils enrolled in JK and K, which is 29.
- JK/SK classes with 16 or more students shall be staffed with a Designated Early Childhood Educator and a classroom teacher.
- JK/SK classes with less than 16 students are staffed with a classroom teacher.

Primary Class Size (Grades 1-3)

- At least 90% of all primary classes must have a student enrolment of 20 or less.
- Up to 10% of primary classes in the system may exceed the cap of 20 students.

- School boards are required to submit their completed submissions through SFIS
 no later than September 30, 2019. The ministry will not accept submissions after
 this date.
- The 2019-20 Capital Priorities projects are expected to be completed and open no later than the 2023-24 school year. This is a five-year period covered by the Ministry and is longer than previous capital request periods.
- School boards have an opportunity to request child care capital funding for Capital Priorities projects, if the local Consolidated Municipal Service Manager (CMSM) or District Social Services Administration Board (DSSAB) support the need and confirm the proposed new space will not result in an operating pressure for the CMSM or DSSAB. As part of our submissions we met with the Region of Durham to include child care requests in our Catholic Elementary School projects.

- 5. Unnamed Seaton Catholic Secondary School New Grade 7-12 School;
- 6. Unnamed Kedron#1 Catholic Elementary School New Grade JK- 6 School;
- 7. Unnamed Brooklin Catholic Secondary School New Grade 7-12 School;

Project Details

A brief summary of each project is prepared below including details with respect to the program requirements, number of pupil places being proposed for construction, the proposed date of opening, site details, source of funding etc.

Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School - Replacement School Grades 7-12:

- The existing Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School operates at 87% of its capacity with 852 students located in a building with a capacity for 981 students. Significant portions of the school were originally constructed in 1963 and the building is not located in close proximity to growth or the balance of the feeder schools and students that will sustain the school in the future;
- The Board requires a replacement school of 1,061 pupil places to serve a Grade 7-12 population, with the provision that a multi-storey addition to the school also be part of the planned long-term expansion;
- A new Catholic Secondary School site is required to facilitate the relocation and reconstruction of the existing Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School for 2019. This site is located on Harmony Road North and measures 14 acres in size. The site is part of the Boards 2019 Educational Development Charges (EDCs) Background study and is eligible for acquisition through the Board's EDC reserve;

• If approved in the fall of 2019 or winter of 2020, the Board would proceed to purchase the lands for the replacement school immediately. • The proposed building cost of a 130,455 square foot school is \$33.2 million, and the proposed cost to acquire and prepare the site is \$34.6 million

Unnamed Seaton #1 Catholic Elementary School – New School:

- The Seaton community in Pickering is under significant development Board initially submitted this project in 2012 for consideration to the Ministry of Education, and in subsequent capital requests since. The community is fully under construction of new homes and students are being sent to interim accommodation at St. Andre Bessette CS. The Board has requested that a new 608 pupil place elementary school be approved and proposes a September 2022 opening date, if approval is received at the beginning of 2020;
- In addition, an 88 space Child Care facility and a Child and family Centre are requested to be added to this project to provide space for an infant, toddler, and preschool childcare in the new community;
- The Board has 4 designated sites within the Seaton community and are working to secure an option to purchase each of these sites from developers. Each of the Catholic Elementary School sites is eligible for EDC funding;
- If approved by the Ministry of Education, the Board would retain an architect and begin design and site plan submission immediately to the City of Pickering. It will take approximately 2 years from the approval of the project to design the new school and complete construction;
- The Board is requesting approval from the Ministry for Growth School funding at the capital benchmark amounts.
- The site purchase and all eligible site works will be paid for using the Educational Development Charges funding collected by the Board.
- The proposed building cost of a 70,283 square foot school and child care centre is \$17.8 million, and the proposed cost to acquire and prepare the site is \$17.4 million

Unnamed West Whitby #1 Catholic Elementary School – New School:

- The West Whitby Planning area is under construction and is generating new students who have started to attend St. Luke the Evangelist CS.

Unnamed Seaton #2 Catholic Elementary School – New School:

- A second Seaton community Catholic Elementary school will be required to address the volume of growth and number of projected students. The Board has requested that a new 412 pupil place elementary school be approved and proposes a September 2024 opening date, if approval is received at the beginning of 2020;
- In addition, a 73 space Child Care facility and a Child and family Centre are requested to be added to this project to provide space for an infant, toddler, and preschool childcare in the new community;
- The Board has 4 designated sites within the Seaton community and are working
 to secure an option to purchase each of these sites from developers. The second
 site will be selected based on the accessibility and readiness of this site from
 among the three remaining Seaton elementary school sites;
- If approved by the Ministry of Education, the Board would retain an architect and begin design and site plan submission immediately to the City of Pickering. Given a 2024 opening date, staff foresee construction commencing in 2022. It will take approximately 2 years from the approval of the project to design the new school and complete construction;
- The Board is requesting approval from the Ministry for Growth School funding at the capital benchmark amounts.
- The site purchase and all eligible site works will be paid for using the Educational Development Charges funding collected by the Board.
- The proposed building cost of a 56,179 square foot school is \$14.2 million, and the proposed cost to acquire and prepare the site is \$24.9 million

- The facility will include regular classrooms to serve grade 7-12 students, an

 commons, science labs, art rooms, music rooms, technological education

 rooms, administration area, student services and all required ancillary spaces.
- The Board currently owns a 15-acre secondary school at the northwest corner of Cachet Boulevard and Winchester Road. It is intended that the Board will relocate the site to lands north of Columbus Road on the west side of Baldwin Street which is more central to the Brooklin Planning Area.
- The intended capacity of the school is a combined 800 pupil places and would have both an elementary and secondary component. The pupil places will be added proportionally to the Boards elementary and secondary capacities.
- If approved in 2020, the Board would begin the purchase of the new site, retain an architect and begin design and site plan submission immediately. It will be possible to open the school for September 2024.
- The Board is requesting approval from the Ministry for Growth School funding at the capital benchmark amounts. In addition, all eligible site works will be paid for using the Educational Development Charges funding collected by the Board.
- The proposed building cost of a 92,087 square foot school is \$23.5 million, and the proposed cost to acquire and prepare the site is \$54.4 million




APPENDIX 1: MONSIGNOR PAUL DWYER CHS REPLACEMENT LOCATION MAP




APPENDIX 2: UNNAMED SEATON #1 CES LOCATION MAP




APPENDIX 3: UNNAMED SEATON #2 CES LOCATION MAP




APPENDIX 4: UNNAMED KEDRON #1 CES LOCATION MAP




APPENDIX 5: UNNAMED WEST WHITBY #1 LOCATION MAP

On May 27, 2019 the Board of Trustees approved boundary changes for the English and French Immersion programs at St. Christopher Catholic School and St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School starting in 2020.

This report proposes that the boundaries related to Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School and Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School be amended to align with the boundary changes that were approved by the Board for St. Christopher Catholic School and St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School.

Boundary Policy

In accordance with Board Policy PO-415 School Boundary, a proposed school boundary is developed for each Catholic Elementary and Secondary School located within the Board's jurisdiction. The development of boundaries is undertaken to create neighbourhood or community schools. The boundary of each school should be of a sufficient size to sustain the long-term operation of the school at a full or near full capacity level.

Following the meetings with the affected communities, and based on input from these communities, a final report on the proposed set boundaries is brought to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Boundary Review Process

Staff develop draft boundaries for review by Administrative Council; The draft boundaries are brought forward to Trustees for Approval "In Principle"; Staff are directed to meet with the affected school communities to present the approved "In Principle" boundaries and receive public input; Staff review all input and present the proposed final boundaries to the Board of Trustees for approval;

The Board of Trustees provides final approval to the boundaries; Staff communicates the approved boundaries to all affected parents and guardians of students living within the school boundaries and communicate all changes to attendance.

The impact of the proposed changes to the boundary will start in 2023 with additional students attending Monsignor John Pereyma CSS for grade 7, and a small decline in the number of students forecast for Monsignor Paul Dwyer CHS starting in 2025.

Recommended Boundary Option

Staff recommends that the Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School and boundary be amended by removing the area south of King Street West (Hwy#2) and west of Stevenson Road South and directing all students to attend Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School for the Regular Track (English) program for grades 9-12.

Implementation

Proposed boundary changes may contain several provisions for implementation. In the case of the proposed boundary change between Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School and Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School, there are several considerations related to implementation.

- All students in the area affected by the proposed boundary change currently attending Monsignor Paul Dwyer CHS for Grades 9-12 in 2020 may continue to attend the school until graduation.
- As of September 1, 2020, any new students who move into the area of the proposed boundary change in Grades 9- 12 will be directed to attend Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School.
- All students within the area affected by the boundary change who will attend St.
 Thomas Aquinas Catholic School starting in September 2020, will be directed to
 attend Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School for Grades 7-12
 (this will effectively start in September 2023 with Grade 7 students).
- Students from the area of the elementary boundary change in Grades 5-8 at St. Christopher Catholic School will continue to attend the school until the end of Grade 8 and will then attend Monsignor Paul Dwyer CHS for Grades 9-12 (this will end by June 2027 when the last Grade 12 students graduate);
- Transportation to Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School or Monsignor John Pereyma Catholic Secondary School will be provided in accordance with Board Policy.


Next Steps



The Child Care alterations and addition have been designed and are ready for the issuance of tender. The Board is still awaiting an approval to proceed from the Ministry of Education. Once the approval is received the Board will be able to issue the tender and commence construction. Should the required approvals be received early in the fall, the planned opening date for the addition will be September 2020.

Open a new Child Care at Monsignor Philip Coffey Catholic School

The Child Care addition has been designed and prepared for the issuance of tender. This project involves the replacement of all site services at the school. The Board is still awaiting an approval to proceed from the Ministry of Education. Once the approval is received the Board will be able to issue the tender and commence construction. Should the required approvals be received early in the fall, the planned opening date for the addition will be January 2021.

Open expanded Child Care centre at St. Theresa Catholic School

Demolish the existing St. Marguerite D'Youville Catholic School and relocate students

The Board is working to replace the existing 323 pupil place St. Marguerite D'Youville Catholic School, Child Care Centre and Family and Community Hub space located on Michael Boulevard.

All required measures to temporarily accommodate students were completed over the summer and the staff and students have been relocated to St. John the Evangelist Catholic School for the duration of the project.

The Ministry of Education issued its approval to proceed letter to the Durham Catholic District School Board on August 23, 2019. This approval allows the Board to issue the demolition and construction tender for the project.

The architect has submitted all required site and architectural drawings to the Town of Whitby for approval of both site plan and building permit. The Board will issue the tender documents in the coming weeks and begin the demolition process during the fall. It is anticipated that construction will be completed by November 2020 and the school reoccupied shortly thereafter.

Rationale

The Council of Ontario Directors of Education (CODE) provided full funding for the 2019 Summer Learning Program for the Durham Catholic District School Board. Our Board continues to support and assist the literacy learning of over 690 students over the past 6 summers.

During the summer of 2019 our Board supported 120 Kindergarten to Grade 2 students. Our program was offered at three school locations: Msgr. Philip Coffey Catholic School, Oshawa, St. Kateri Tekakwitha Catholic School, Oshawa and St. Bernadette Catholic School, Ajax.

The program included Robotics which included the use of Lego kits, motors and basic software for students, which allowed boys/girls to make their own movable machines. "Ozobots" simple robots that used basic coding. Every Summer RAYS site had a trained Student Tutor working with the children on Robotics and Coding.

At Board level, the involvement of Katie Plaunt, Speech and Language Pathologist was evident again this summer. Katie's role included orientation to staff prior to the summer program and during the program. Katie provided individual consultation and/or screening programming suggestions to parents.

Each Summer Learning site had a Durham Health professional advocating Healthy Living and Wellness to parents and their children. These Health professionals worked with each classroom teacher at all 3 summer school sites to provide information to parents through workshops, direct contact and resource materials.

EDSBY was the tool of communicating to Parents about their child's daily summer school learning and activities continued this summer. The Summer RAYS program embodies the guiding principles of the Durham Catholic District School Board. This program encourages parents to be engaged in their child's academic achievement.

The Summer Learning Program continues to build student well-being and good health and the program continues to speak to the child, who has difficulty reading and writing and says, "You are valued and supported" in your learning journey.



- Encourage a greater focus on mentally healthy schools and classrooms through the implementation of the Aligned and Integrated Model from School Mental Health Ontario.
- Equip staff to notice and respond appropriately to students experiencing concerns with belonging and safety.
- Use data from the School Climate Surveys to refine goals in the Board and School Bullying Prevention Plans.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Analyze data from the Leading Mentally Healthy Schools Reflection tool.
- Observe engagement and interactions with students noted during school monitoring visits.
- Review and analyze results from the School Climate Surveys.

To build capacity in Mental Health, Equity and Inclusive Education, Safe and Accepting Schools and Healthy Schools for all members of the DCDSB community.

- Increase opportunities for parents/caregivers to build their knowledge and understanding of student well-being.
- Design and deliver role-specific mental health awareness and literacy for all staff.
- Raise awareness among stakeholders on the importance of daily physical activity for students, and how to optimize recess and regular movement breaks.
- Support stakeholders in their understanding and implementation of Bias Free decision making.
- Enhance the capacity of all educators to use Culturally Responsive Pedagogy to recognize that all students learn differently and that these differences may be connected to background, language, family structure and social or cultural identity.

- Gather feedback and data from administrators and Student Achievement teams during face-to-face meetings, such as Family of Schools meetings, school monitoring visits, School Improvement Plan meetings and classroom visits.
- Review and analyze anecdotal feedback shared during Student Voice Forums.
- Gather parent/caregiver feedback to assess their understanding of student well-being.
- Gather data on the increased implementation of daily physical activities.

To ensure consistent use of evidence-informed practices, strategies and programs.

- Strengthen our ability to prevent and respond to all forms of bullying.
- Strengthen the use of tier one (universal) and tier two (targeted) programs and interventions.
- Increase student access to brief mental health intervention.
- Provide role-specific training and support to improve outcomes for students with special education needs.
- Strengthen educator capacity in the implementation of Learning Profiles for students with Special Education needs.

- Track pre and post assessment data for targeted groups.
- Analyze Individual Education Plans for implementation of targeted programs and interventions.
- Track implementation of Learning Profiles.
- Collect survey data on role-specific professional learning needs.



Excellence in teaching and learning hinges upon understanding the instructional core, which is the interconnected relationship between student, educator and curriculum. All educators are called upon to use this knowledge to facilitate modernized learning environments and experiences that engage students in building global competencies and attaining the Catholic School Graduate Expectations.



Essential Practices:

Innovative and engaging experiences are built upon the foundation of Literacy, Numeracy and faith across the curriculum.

Our Catholic learning communities will:

- emphasize high expectations for Literacy and Numeracy that will be evident throughout each school;
- employ a variety of research-based strategies and assessments to address students' interests, learning styles and readiness in teaching practices; and
- plan and reflect upon the relevant and meaningful inclusion of our Catholic School Graduate Expectations and Social Teachings throughout all subject areas.

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Goals

To ensure meaningful and varied assessments are used to improve student learning, inform instruction and determine next steps.

Actions

(What actions/resources will support this priority?)

- Identify an Assessment and Evaluation Lead who will develop an annual professional learning plan to build educator capacity with Growing Success.
- Build educator capacity to use electronic platforms to increase and support Evidence of Learning.
- Ensure capacity building sessions have an assessment focus (balancing/coherence of observation, conversation, product; as well as cycle of assessment for, as, of).
- Provide opportunities for students to learn about their role in assessment for learning, setting goals and determining next steps.
- Strengthen educator capacity in the use of Student Learning Profiles to support instruction based on students' strengths, interests and learning styles.
- Share educator assessment best practices through a variety of board communication tools, such as Numeracy Notes.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Gather feedback and data from administrators and Student Achievement teams during face-to-face meetings, such as Family of Schools meetings, school monitoring visits, School Improvement Plan meetings and classroom visits.
- Track the use of EDSBY by parents, educators and students.
- Analyze exit tickets after Professional Development (PD) sessions to evaluate understanding of content delivered.
- Analyze report card data through EDSBY, Compass for Success.
- Review EQAO data:
 - > Contextual data
 - > Attitudes and Behavioural data
 - > Demographic data
 - > Cohort data
 - > Special Education data
- Facilitate cyclical assessments to Numeracy questions (created and provided by board), and student responses at various points in the year.
- Track consistent use of visual models in Numeracy.

To build learning environments which engage students and honour Indigenous peoples and a variety of cultural perspectives.

- Provide opportunities for students to be partners in decisions impacting their educational experience.
- Seek student voice that reflects the diversity, needs and interests of the student population regarding their educational experience, and policies and programs through a variety of channels.
- Monitor engagement through activities, such as Equity Walks, student surveys, conferencing, parental feedback, exit cards, photo video analysis, documentation of student learning, and a variety of student assessments.

Goals

Actions

(What actions/resources will support this priority?)

- Provide opportunities for professional learning about Indigenous Education matters with all staff.
- Build capacity within schools to ensure that all learners see themselves, their values, culture and interests reflected in their learning environment (e.g. English language learners).

To ensure equitable access to authentic and significant experiential learning opportunities for all students.

- Build a shared understanding of experiential learning to foster coherence amongst educators, students, and community partners.
- Continue to collaborate with current partners to seek out resources and support for students that enhance experiential learning opportunities through mentorship, funding, etc.
- Seek new partnerships with community organizations to enhance experiential learning opportunities for students with a particular focus on promoting skilled trades.
- Engage educator leads in collaborative inquiries/ professional learning around policy framework to lead experiential learning experiences.
- Engage students and educators in communityconnected outdoor education and experiential learning opportunities within the community.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Track feedback received through conversations with students, variety of student assessments, and community involvement (SWIS, Indigenous Members).
- Review exit tickets and surveys after PD sessions.
- Monitor engagement among diverse groups through Equity Walks, observation of learning commons and school community environment.
- Gather feedback and data from administrators and Student Achievement teams during face-to-face meetings, such as Family of Schools meetings, school monitoring visits, School Improvement Plan meetings and classroom visits.
- Analyze feedback in pre and post surveys, conferencing, and observations of educators, students and community partners to assess their understanding of experiential learning.
- Feedback form and surveys from community partners.
- Collect data to determine existing number of community partners and increase in new partnerships through the years.
- Review results from exit tickets and surveys after PD sessions and learning fairs.
- Collect data via observations, conversations and products that measure the increase in student engagement and achievement.



Expanding Pathways

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you. And not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Education and career/life planning helps students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 and beyond set and achieve their personal goals; and become competent, successful, contributing members of society. Staff must be responsive to the interests, needs, and strengths of all students to engage them in learning and prepare them to make informed decisions for their education, career and life outside of school.



Essential Practices:

A pathways planning mindset ensures that all students from Kindergarten to adulthood develop the knowledge and skills they require to make informed education and career/life choices.

Our Catholic learning communities will:

- focus on students' strengths and personalized growth plan;
- ensure that all students have an honourable pathway; and
- promote student engagement and success by listening to and learning from students.

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Goals

To promote comprehensive education and career/life planning programs that meet the learning needs, interests and aspiration of all students.

To enhance opportunities

Actions

(What actions/resources will support this priority?)

- Develop and implement programming that supports pathways exploration.
- Develop and implement a plan that provides the smooth integration of Alternative Education and Continuing Education.
- Ensure effective transition planning for all students, especially students with Individual Education Plans.
- Expand opportunities to use student voice to enhance programming and assessment.

experiences and experiential learning in all classrooms

- Work collaboratively with the Experiential Learning Coordinator to develop a plan to expand the use of experiential learning for children, youth and adult learners.
- Conduct outreach and develop partnerships with community and industry partners.
- Develop educator understanding of experiential learning in order to expand the types of experiential learning opportunities available for students.
- Increase awareness and programming opportunities for women and Indigenous students in the trades.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Monitor experiential learning opportunities and footprints in Dual Credit, OYAP and SHSM programs.
- Gather feedback from students based on their experiences in Alternative Education and Continuing Education programs.
- Review the rate of course completion for Alternative Education and Continuing Education programs.
- Gather feedback from student forums and exit surveys.
- Gather feedback and data from administrators and Student Achievement teams during face-to-face meetings, such as Family of Schools meetings, school monitoring visits, School Improvement Plan meetings and classroom visits.
- Document new experiential learning partnerships.
- Track experiential learning opportunities developed in partnership with community and industry partners in all schools and grades, including the number of students involved.

To promote authentic, relevant and meaningful student inquiry for a deeper learning experience.

- Implement myBlueprint to support pathways and transitions inquiry.
- Ensure all students in Grades 7 to 12 create transition plans that support their Individualized Pathways Plans.
- Intermediate guidance teachers work collaboratively with students and staff to facilitate pathways and transitions planning.
- Promote the use of guidance teachers as a resource for intermediate students to raise awareness about their role in assisting with pathways and transitions planning.

- Track dates of professional development and usage by students and staff.
- Gather data on completion of Individualized Pathways Plans and transition plans.
- Gather data that reflects the number of interactions with students and guidance staff.





Managing Resources

Stewardship of resources is essential to the efficient and effective management and operation of the board. Financial, human resource and asset management will promote a fiscally responsible Catholic school system which is integral to public trust, transparency and accountability. Management of resources oriented towards student achievement, well-being and faith formation priorities is the responsibility of each employee.



Essential Practices:

Managing resources is essential for system alignment, financial stewardship, risk management, and effective use of board assets.

Our Catholic learning communities will:

- establish sustainable priorities and raise stakeholder confidence;
- utilize emerging technology to support innovation, communications, learning and efficacy; and
- build partnerships and connections to enhance Catholic education.

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Goals

To ensure allocation of resources that reflects the principles of equity and financial stewardship.

Actions

(What actions/resources will support this priority?)

- Formulate a strategy to maintain a rigorous and intentional zero-based balanced budget process that aligns with board and Ministry of Education goals and priorities, and incorporates stakeholder input.
- Refresh the board's Long-Term Accommodation Plan to identify system needs, program opportunities and incorporate Ministry policy directives.
- Review current resource management and environmental stewardship processes to identify potential opportunities in accordance with best practice and reflective of Catholic social teachings.
- Formulate and implement an equity-based school finances model that reflects and supports the unique needs of each community.
- Complete a review of the board's job evaluation and pay equity plans and implement a revised compensation program for unionized and nonunionized staff.
- Work with all departments to expand partnerships in the broader community and to explore opportunities to better utilize board facilities and create program, networking and financial opportunities.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Review the annual budget with stakeholders to demonstrate that it reflects the Board Improvement Plan and is in compliance with Ministry funding parameters.
- Review utilization of board facilities annually.
- Track and celebrate as all schools continue to be recognized as Eco-certified with sustained investment in the energy/waste management programs to control costs and reduce the Board's energy and waste footprint.
- Establish a school finances working group to incorporate relevant factors into the annual school finances funding model.
- Monitor progress of completion of job evaluations.
- Review annually the current roster of partnerships by school and department and areas for future development.

To modernize processes for increased engagement, improved efficiency and enhanced effectiveness.

- Implement a new Enterprise Resource Program to enhance operations and reporting in Human Resources and Financial Services.
- Engage with all employee groups to foster positive relations and work environments.
- Monitor progress of implementation of new Enterprise Resources Program.
- Track enhanced opportunities for developing positive relations with all employee groups.

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Goals

Actions

(What actions/resources will support this priority?)

- Leverage the board's various communication tools including the website and other online platforms to enhance community engagement, consultation and dialogue.
- Monitor, review and adapt operating procedures and infrastructure to ensure effective cyber-security and data protection in accordance with best practices.

Monitoring / Metrics

(How will we measure and know that it is working?)

- Review feedback from community engagement opportunities to determine effectiveness of communication tools.
- Monitor annual assessment by external audit and regular reminders/communication to staff.

To develop staff at all levels of the organization to improve outcomes, cultivate future leadership and plan for succession.

- Utilize the results of the Workforce Census to support the development of diverse and qualified school and administrative leadership teams.
- Collaborate with all employee groups on the identification of professional learning opportunities that are reflective of individual and system needs.
- Increase in the number of participants in the Aspiring Leaders Program, both academic and corporate.
- Support new hires and appointees through the board's PVP mentoring, new teacher induction and support staff orientation programs.

- Use survey data to identify current gaps and opportunities, and to inform strategies to enhance the board's recruitment and development programs.
- Track completion of annual growth and learning plans by all employees.
- Track participation in Aspiring Leaders Program.
- Track orientation and peer mentoring support provided to all new hires and appointees.

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
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
