#### 2.3.1. Annual Chief Financial Overview

- Chief Financial Officer, Marie Hammond presented an overview of the board's finances. Highlights from her presentation include:
  - Balanced Budget and Operating Accumulated Surplus
  - Funding Envelopes and Deferred Revenue
  - Revised Estimates Highlights
  - Enrolment
  - Moving Forward
- She noted that over the past two years, operating reserves were utilized to promote student and staff safety, hire additional support staff, address remote learning options, and purchase additional technology.
- The Ministry of Education allowed the use of up to 2% of operating revenues from a board's operating reserve per year during the pandemic, providing additional funding to boards with less than 2% available. Through the use of DCDSB's accumulated surplus, the board was able to obtain supplemental funding that further supported pandemicrelated costs.
- The board would like to replenish its operating accumulated surplus to 1% 2% of its operating revenue. The increase in enrolment from Estimates to Revised Estimates in 2022/2023 has allowed the board to provide an allocation to accumulated surplus of \$266,064. From May 2022 to October 2022, the board has increased enrolment by 352 students. The latest estimates project that DCDSB will see a modest increase in enrolment of 1.1% to 1.7% over each of the next three years.
- Looking ahead to 2023-2024, the board will look at the following priorities to determine its budget: enrolment, grants

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for students' needs, transportation costs and the new transportation funding formula to be introduced for 2023-2024, inflation, current labour negotiations, accumulated surplus replenishment and the new Multi-Year Strategic Plan.

Ms. Hammond responded to guestions from trustees.

- Superintendent Grieve and Superintendent O'Neill presented on the Brooklin Regular (English) Track Study. Highlights from their presentation include:

Director Barill provided the following report:

- Congratulations to Gabriel, a Grade 5 student from St. Paul Catholic School who won the Durham Regional Police Services (DRPS) Police Chief for a Day contest. Gabriel was one of ten finalists selected to read their essays to a community panel of judges which included Chief Todd Rollauer, members of the Police Services Board and members of the Police Appreciation Dinner and Awards Night Committee. More than 100 essays were submitted from Grade 5 students from across Durham Region. Gabriel served as Chief for a Day on Tuesday, October 25, 2022, and was the guest of honour at the 16th Annual DRPS Police Appreciation Dinner and Awards night on October 27. The Director shared a video of Gabriel, who was the board's Student Spotlight for December 2022.
- Congratulations also to the Grade 3 and Grade 5 & 6 students at St. Joseph Catholic School, in Oshawa and the Grade 11-12 senior instrumental music students from All Saints Catholic Secondary School for being named as top 10 finalists in their respective categories in the CBC Canadian Music Class Challenge. Both schools have won this national award in the past few years and continue to showcase the great musical talent of our students. While Trustees cannot always attend every event, I express my appreciation to DCDSB's school administrators for sharing the invitations. Having an opportunity to be present in our Catholic Schools once again is certainly a blessing.
- Last week I had the great opportunity, along with Trustee Hall and Superintendent Sorhaitz to visit some of the Ajax schools. Our thanks to Superintendent Sorhaitz for organizing these visits. Trustee Hall and myself also attended some beautiful Advent masses at St. James Catholic School, as well as St. Teresa of Calcutta Catholic School in Ajax.
- Last month, the Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association (OCSTA) held two orientation sessions for current and newly elected trustees. These workshops were a welcomed opportunity to deepen trustees' understanding of the use of Robert's Rules of Order and Conflict of Interest. 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#### 4.4. Student Trustees Report

- Introduction: The months of November and December were quite eventful for many student clubs and councils. We saw a plethora of events take place, from musicals, showcases, fundraisers and semiformals. It is very exciting to see student bodies become re-engaged in social activities for students to be more engaged with their peers. We hope to see student engagement continue as it not only encourages positive morale in schools, but it encourages students to become more involved in projects and initiatives they are passionate about.

- OSTA: Student Trustee Nwaoha and her working group have been at work drafting an outline covering their projects for the year, as well as an outline for a workshop or session she and her working group are hoping to lead at the OSTA-AECO AGM in May. They have also been in conversations with the Student Well-Being Working group on a potential collaboration for the year centered around inequalities surrounding intramural sports and programs.
- In the Catholic Cabinet of OSTA-AECO Student Trustee Esan's fellow cabinet members are working on a Catholic Student Trustee handbook set to come out in the new year. As a member of the communications working group, Student Trustee Esan has been working on different media projects outlining the roles of Student trustees.

#### **Purpose**

Durham Catholic District School Board, in partnership with its Indigenous Education Circle (I.E.C.) and Student Indigenous Education Circle (S.I.E.C) is committed to increasing understanding and knowledge of all students about Indigenous histories, cultures, perspectives and contributions. This work is fundamental to our commitment to respond to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada; Calls to Action as it relates to education.

#### **Background**

In 2007, the Ministry of Education created the Ontario First Nation, Metis and Inuit Education Policy Framework. It set out two challenges; to improve student achievement among First Nation, Metis and Inuit students and to close the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous students in the areas of literacy and numeracy, retention of students in school, graduation rates, and advancement to postsecondary schools. In its vision statement, it stated; "All students in Ontario will have knowledge and appreciation of contemporary and traditional First Nation, Metis and Inuit traditions, cultures and perspectives."

In 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action was introduced and has deepened our understanding about historic inequities experienced by First Nation, Metis and Inuit in the colonization of Canada as well as the lingering impact. As we are called to learn from the past, to help in the present it is understood that education today is a critical gateway on the path forward. Truth is part of new understanding as we continue to learn about our shared history in a manner that is safe, respectful, inclusive and reflective of equity in the classroom.

We Walk the Path Together: An Update on Indigenous Education

Reconciliation is part of new relationships as we continue to learn about our shared history in a manner that is student-centred with a focus on harm reduction (healing)/life promotion and reflective of Ontario Catholic Graduate Expectations, our new Multi-year Strategic Plan, board vision and mission and Catholic values.

#### Information/Analysis/Research

In Discovery 2023: Renewing the Vision Strategic Plan, we identified five goals within Indigenous Education to guide the learning and work we do. The five goals were as follows:

# 1) To ensure better understanding and provide learning about days/seasons of significance to Indigenous peoples.

The Indigenous Education Team continues to work with our communications department to highlight days/events of significance on social media and the Board website. Some examples are Truth and Reconciliation Day, the Metis Flag raising on Louis Riel Day and the National Indigenous Veterans Day. The Team continues to communicate with staff through numbered memos and the Weekly Buzz. The consultants and resources teachers have been busy delivering lunch and learns with most schools in the system and providing resources to staff to better support the learning of Indigenous perspectives, history and culture. Indigenous education has also been incorporated within our Professional development days where staff completed some deeper learning on residential schools and how we all have a role to play in Reconciliation.

#### 2) To build understanding of authentic reconciliation.

In order to build understanding of authentic reconciliation, the Indigenous Education Unit has focussed on unpacking the papal visit. Whether within our NBE (Grade 11 English: Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Metis and Inuit Voices) or NDW (Grade 12 Indigenous Issues) classes, our school leaders and our religious education chair, we continue to follow the words of our Holy Father to work toward reconciliation.

# 3) To continue to enhance community collaboration through authentic partnerships.

The Indigenous Education Unit has held two Indigenous Education Circle meetings (October 19 and Dec 13) with our community partners. We have had a number of communities led presentations by Indigenous Education Circle members. Some of these include learning about residential schools through a survivor lens, Metis culture and heritage, and land-based learning. We continue to build capacity with our school leaders to foster positive and active relationships with our Indigenous Community Members.

# 4) To successfully implement the Grade 12 Indigenous Studies course in all Secondary schools

With the roll out of the Grade 12 Indigenous Studies course NDW (Grade 12 Indigenous Issues), the Indigenous Education Team has provided both training and the opportunity for teachers to network to support the learning sessions. We currently have 1553 students enrolled in NBE (Grade 11 English: Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Metis and Inuit Voices) and 93 enrolled in our new NDW (Grade 12 Indigenous Issues) course. We have purchased resources to support the course delivery. Throughout the sessions, we continue to gather feedback from both staff and our students to look for ways to ensure continuous improvement.

#### 5) To continue to incorporate Indigenous voice within K-12 curriculum

With the addition of 3 new resource teachers (2 elementary and 1 secondary), we have been able to support teachers in schools in both student and staff learning on Indigenous education. Our focus has been in the Grade 5/6 level-interweaving Indigenous perspective into the curriculum. The Unit continues to build capacity at all levels of the organization. The Team has expanded the resources and support available to other students in French Immersion and Core French classrooms. As a team, we have worked collaboratively with other units to expand the infusion of Indigenous perspectives. A few examples are working with outdoor education on land-based learning, working with our numeracy unit and working with our science unit to highlight Indigenous stem.

#### **Next Steps**

As we transition to our new Multi-Year Strategic Plan *Inspire 2026*, we will continue to collaborate with our Indigenous Education Circle and our Student Indigenous Education Circle and work to deepen understanding of Indigenous education across the curriculum. We will continue to build capacity and understanding with all areas within the organization about the role they play in moving forward in Reconciliation.

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to provide the Board of Trustees with the Board and Provincial averages from EQAO testing.

#### **Background**

After a 2-year interruption due to Covid-19, Provincial Assessments resumed in the Spring of 2022. The results from Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) and Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) show that the Durham Catholic District School Board continues to be above the Provincial Average in the areas of Reading and Writing.

In 2022, a total of 1352 Grade 3 students wrote the Primary EQAO assessment and 1480 Grade 6 students wrote the Junior EQAO assessment.

At the secondary level, 1214 students enrolled in Grade 9 academic math and 347 students enrolled in Grade 9 applied math participated in the EQAO testing.

With a participation rate of 94%, a total of 1540 eligible Grade 10 students participated in the one-day Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) focused on key skills in reading and writing.

#### 1. Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Qs

- a) Nearly ¾ of students across the Board feel that within their classes, they have a voice that is heard, opinions that are valued, and that the language used in class promotes inclusivity amongst students of different backgrounds
- b) Almost 70% of Grade 9 and Grade 10 students who believe that every student, no matter that their background, living situation, or any other relevant contextual factor, has the same chance and opportunity to succeed in school as anyone else they believe in a level-playing field for all and that it is being observed in the classroom accordingly.

#### 2. Self-Directed Learning and Collaboration

- a) For our Grade 3s and 6s, at least ¾ of our students, and in some cases, nearing 80-90% of these participating students have a positive attitude and mindset/approach to learning and their education the overwhelming majority of these students feel that doing their best in school is important to them.
- b) They also have a strong and resilient attitude towards their schoolwork, with around 70-80% of these students citing that they will keep trying if they make a mistake or perceive something as being difficult.



## Cheers 4:

- DCDSB English Language Learners are achieving significantly higher compared to ELL students across the province in all 3 subject areas of Numeracy and Literacy.
- DCDSB Students who self-identify as Indigenous are achieving at a rate which exceeds provincial results and is not statistically different than the achievement of non-Indigenous students.



## Digging Deeper 1: Gender Gap

- There is no gender gap in Math in the Primary testing, however by Gr. 6 an 8-point gender gap appears, showing a greater percentage of male students reaching provincial standards than female students in Mathematics.
- A similar gender gap negatively impacting the achievement of boys in reading is evident beginning in Gr. 3 and continues through to Gr. 10 OSSLT.

#### 1. Sense of Belonging – Grade 9s and 10s

- a) There is a strong gap/disparity between male students and female students, whereby, overall, male students were more likely to have positive feelings of belonging and establishing connections with teachers and other students, compared to female students.
- b) This extends to discussions of inclusivity as well, as a higher proportion of male students overall feel that "every student has the same opportunity to succeed in my school" compared to female students; the % of female students who outright disagree with this statement is markedly higher than that of male students.

#### **Coordinator's Report**

Helen Killoran, Student Services Consultant, reported on behalf of Teresa Ezquerra.

#### **Project SEARCH update**

Program Support Teachers (PST) from each secondary school have submitted student names as potential candidates for the first group of interns for September 2023. Meetings with each school team (PST, Guidance and Co-op Teachers) were held during the week of January 9th to discuss potential candidates and provide information to share with parents/guardians and students. A webpage has been created and can be accessed at <a href="Project SEARCH">Project SEARCH</a>. The Information Night will be held on Thursday, March 2, 2023 at 6:00 pm at the Pope Francis Centre and simultaneously through Zoom.

The new Program Support Mentoring Program continued in December with learning on how to administer and score the Weschler.

#### **Sharing of Excellence Series for December**

How to Develop Self-Management Systems – participants will learn how to use self-monitoring (an evidence-based practice) to improve engagement with learning and/or to decrease challenging behaviours through teaching individuals to differentiate between appropriate and inappropriate behaviour, monitoring their own behaviour using a recording system, and reinforcing their own behaviours so as to meet goal(s).

#### **Assistive Technology**

100 additional Chromebooks are being prepared and will be delivered to PSTs; this adds to the 240 Chromebooks that have been assigned since 2021

All Lexia licenses are in use; some secondary schools will use Lexia in Semester 2 beginning in February. There are 2 training sessions with Greenfield Learning this month that will review the Lexia program with PSTs and focus on interpreting data for student success.

Helen answered questions as they arose.

#### **Mental Health Report**

**Yulan Fisher-Brown,** Sr. Mgr. Mental Health Initiatives/ Mental Health Leader provided the Mental Health Report.

School Mental Health Ontario (SMH-ON) and Wisdom2Action (W2A) launched #HearNowON: Student Voices on Mental Health will connect with secondary school students in Ontario on their priorities regarding mental health. 1,028 students and young people across Ontario participated through an online survey and approximately 159 young people participated through regional forums or the date analysis process.

Through the data collected, SMH-ON recommended the following:

- 1. Students want to learn more about Mental Health, as part of their regular school day
- 2. Students want their teachers to learn more about mental health so they can be a strong resource in this area
- 3. Students want better and clearer access to supports and services through school
- 4. Students want us to honour diversity and prioritize inclusion and belonging
- 5. Students want to be better informed about, and engaged in, mental health promotion and stigma reduction initiatives

Student Services is working with the New Teacher Induction Program to develop modules focused on various topics, including MH, Equity, Autism, Learning Disabilities, Universal Design of Learning.

SMHO has launched new MH curriculum for the Careers course that will be piloted in the second semester at 4 of our secondary schools.

Talking about Mental Illness programming ran at St. Patrick, St. Monica and St. Anne.

#### **Special Education Review Update**

Superintendent Lee-Fernandes informed that the Leading Equitable and Accessible Delivery (LEAD) Process has been completed and is being used to inform the Special Education Review.

As part of the process, several anonymous surveys were put out to provide feedback and input from various groups. A feedback summary report with aggregate results will be shared with SEAC.

Superintendent Lee-Fernandes also shared that in collaboration with Academic Services, the following virtual Parent/Guardian Kindergarten series will be offered:

- February 15, 2023: Welcome to Kindergarten and Information on Before and After Child Care
- March 8, 2023: Early Literacy Skills
- March 29, 2023: Supporting Transitions for Students with Special Needs
- April 19, 2023: Tips and Strategies to Support Communication Skills and Well-Being

The sessions will provide new parents with information for the foundational transitions for support at home and school.

Superintendent Lee-Fernandes briefly updated the committee on "What does racism have to do with me."

- "Understanding Anti-Black Racism to Support the Mental Health and Well-Being of Black and Racialized Students" session was held on September 14th with the Principals and on the September 23rd PA Day with the staff.
- "Supporting Mentally Healthy Conversation About Anti-Black Racism with Students" was postponed to November 9th and November 15th.
- Both "Your Role as an Adult Ally" and "Tips for Adult Allies" are coming up on January 11th, 17th and February 17th.
- "How to Foster and Maintain Supportive Spaces for Black Youth" will be held on March 1st and 21st.
- "Listen, Believe & Act: Support for students who have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19" will be offered on May 10th and April 18th.

Superintendent Lee-Fernandes also shared that in regard to the Virtual Learning Series, two virtual sessions have been planned with Youth Speak – Inclusivity for Caring Adults:

- January 24, 2023
- February 16, 2023

The sessions will address the effects of intersecting forms of discrimination and oppression through speakers' lived experience and acquired knowledge. The participants will gain a deeper understanding of core concepts around race, ability, etc., and how to practice intersectional inclusion and allyship.

A student conference will be offered to students from grades 7 to 9. The theme will be "Created in the Image of God: I Am because We Are" (Ubuntu). Details will be sent out in a Numbered Memo in mid-January.

Teachers will be able to sign up with their classes to attend three virtual classes. Teachers will also be provided with a training session and resource support.

Tanika Riley, who runs Por Amor, will be facilitating the workshops. The sessions will focus on Identity and embracing who you are, and Mental health.

After the session, teachers will be provided with pre-workshop reflection questions and toolkit for activities and continued conversation in the classroom.

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to share the outcome of the student demographic data collection process which was conducted in the spring of 2022

#### **Background**

Data collection is an important tool for school boards as they work towards identifying and addressing systemic barriers that are related to the Ontario Human Rights Code. Subsequent data analysis can help to ensure programs, services and educational opportunities are equitable for all students.

The Ministry of Education has provided funding and direction to school boards to build capacity to collect, analyze and use voluntary student demographic data for the following purposes, as outlined in the Transfer Payment Agreement:

- promoting inclusive and equitable learning environments in Ontario's publicly funded education system through evidence-informed decision making on policies, improvement planning, training and targeted programs and supports;
- meeting their responsibilities to protect and advance human rights under the Ontario Human Rights Code (the Code); and
- meeting their obligations under the Data Standards for the Identification and Monitoring of Systemic Racism (the Data Standards), and in particular to identify, monitor and address inequities with respect to student course enrollment (i.e., academic, applied, locally developed courses), suspensions, expulsions, exclusions and students receiving special education.

Memorandum | Page 2 of 5 Student Census (2021-2022) Report

In April 2022, the Durham Catholic District School Board (DCDSB) conducted the voluntary "Stand Up, Be Counted, Be Heard" Student Census for students from Grades 4-12. Students from grades 9-12 were invited to complete the survey independently, whereas, for students from Grades 4-8, the student census was sent directly to parents /guardians for completion at home.

#### **Census Mandate**

The government of Ontario set the following mandates to guide the survey process:

- i. Promote the DCDSB's understanding and support of the diversity of students and their families,
- ii. Eliminate barriers to student success,
- iii. Enrich students' learning by providing the right supports at the right time, while making schools a safer, more welcoming space to belong to, and
- iv. Deepen the DCDSB's understanding of how to gauge the impact of systemic barriers on the student's desk.

#### **Outcomes**

#### **Key Demographic Indicators**

6,239 students completed the Student Census, approximating a 39% participation rate of the entire DCDSB student population (out of approximately 15,900 eligible students in Grades 4-12 in the 2021-2022 school year). Participating students ranged from Grades 4-12, with Grade 7 students accounting for the highest rate of participation (13.5% or 838 students), and the lowest rate of participation coming from Grade 12 students (7.5% or 466 students)

#### **Census Participation and Mode of Analysis**

Out of the 6,239 DCDSB students who completed the Census, Grades 4-8 made up 63.3% (3,947) while Grades 9-12 made up 36.7% (2,292) of those who completed the survey. Quantitative measures of analysis were used to summarize responses for each identity question. Several of the questions provided open-ended options. Generalizations, analysis and conclusions must be mindful that there was a 39% response rate overall. The census participation rates across the region were as follows:

- 1. Whitby FOS (30%)
- 2. Ajax FOS (25%)
- 3. Oshawa FOS (20%)
- 4. Pickering FOS (18%)
- 5. Brooklin FOS (4%)
- 6. Uxbridge FOS (2%)
- 7. Port Perry FOS & Beaverton FOS (1%)

#### **Reporting Measures and Caveats**

The data in this report represents participating students only (i.e. students who completed the Census questions) and does not include missing or inadmissible data, students who opted out, etc. Multiple data cleaning processes took place with careful considerations made to ensure data is presented as it was initially reported, to honour the voice of DCDSB students and how they choose to self-identify. This data is presented in graphical and, where possible, tabular format for all Census questions. #### **Limitations and Unlocking Future Potential**

A notable limitation of the Student Census was the low participation rate across the entire Board, accounting for approximately a 39% completion rate. As a result, there are obvious gaps in the data which may not provide a complete picture of DCDSB's student population.

Although the response rate of participating students was high for most of the questions (>90%), some questions had lower response rates than others, accounting for more blanks or non-responses.

Beyond formatting issues, other factors that may have accounted for the Census completion rate overall include the clarity of the questions asked, the lack of students' knowledge of particular subject areas, and the sensitive nature of some of questions.

### **Next Steps**

#### Effect of 39% participation and augmenting with School Climate Survey

The DCDSB Student Census completion rate of 39% falls below the acceptable census participation/completion rate of 80%, for which reliance can be placed on a census data. To help address this, DCDSB plans to augment the Student Census result with data from the School Climate Survey recently conducted in all DCDSB schools.

The DCDSB will collaborate with students, staff, families, and other stakeholders to identify the cause(es) of the low census participation rate and take steps to effectively increase completion rates of future censuses. This is essential in ensuring that the data gap resulting from low student participation rate is closed.

Future censuses will be reformatted to be more accommodating of the diverse ways that censuses may be accessed and completed. Questions will also be restructured to afford easier understanding and better completion rates.

#### Frequency of conducting the Student Census

The DCDSB has developed a continuous data collection system through voluntary identity-based questions that are embedded in the admission process during student enrollment. This will help in gathering relevant data in the non-census years. A future data collection process may be contemplated but is not planned at this time.

#### **Looking Forward**

The Ministry of Education identified inequities which the Student Census is intended to address to include "student course enrollment (i.e., academic, applied, locally developed courses), suspensions, expulsions, exclusions and students receiving special education." Future surveys will focus on these specific areas through questions that will aid in gathering data that would help in developing policies that effectively address systemic discrimination and barriers that limit student success.

## Background Info

In April 2022, the DCDSB "Stand Up, Be Counted, Be Heard" Student Census was administered to students, parents/guardians in Grades 4-8, and to students in Grades 9-12

The Student Census is a government-mandated policy requiring all Ontario school boards to gather identity-based data and complete by 2023. Participation by students and parents/guardians was voluntary, providing capacity and space for participants to skip questions they chose not to answer for any reason

**Census Mandate**: To help the DCDSB understand and support the diversity of students and their families, eliminate barriers to student success, enrich students' learning by providing the right supports at the right time, while making schools a safer, more welcoming space to belong to; to deepen our understanding of how to gauge the impact on the student's desk.

## Key Demographic Indicators



6,239 students completed the Student Census, approximating a 39% participation rate of the entire DCDSB student population (out of approximately 15,900 eligible students in Grades 4-12 in the 2021-2022 school year)



Participating students ranged from Grades 4-12, with the highest rate of participation coming from Grade 7 students (13.5% or 838 students), and the lowest rate of participation coming from Grade 12 students (7.5% or 466 students)



Across our Family of Schools, the Whitby Family of Schools had the highest overall level of participation in the DCDSB Census

















## Census Q5 (Aggregated): Students' Self-Identified Race - Results












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
## Census Q8 (Aggregated): Students' Sexual Orientation - Results








## Census Q11A): Students' Living Situation – Results

Parent/Guardian (P1) that you live with most of the time - what is your relation? (%)




# Census Q11B): Students' Parent/Guardian (P1) Highest Education Level – Results

Parent/Guardian (P1) – Highest Level of Education (%)




# Census Q11C): Students' Parent/Guardian (P1) Employment Status – Results







"THAT the Durham Catholic District School Board approve the Schedule of Financial Reports to the Board of Trustees as outlined in this report."

#### **Background**

As part of the regular review process, the Ministry of Education performs risk assessments on school boards to assess its financial position. A major component of this assessment is based on the remaining accumulated surplus or operating reserve a Board has to address any unforeseen situations and associated costs. In general, the Ministry has a benchmark of an available accumulated surplus equivalent to two percent or greater of its annual operating allocation to maintain a low risk status. For the Durham Catholic District School Board that would require an accumulated surplus of approximately \$5.0 million.

Over the past two years, the Board utilized all of its accumulated surplus to address Covid-19 related costs and filed its 2021/2022 financial statements with a zero-balance remaining. During the 2022/2023 Revised Estimates cycle, the Board was able to start the process of replenishing the accumulated surplus with a provision to accumulated surplus of \$266,064. With little to no operating reserves, the Board will continue to be assessed as a high-risk board. As such, the Ministry will continue to require a monthly financial report from the Board. The Board has been filing these reports on a monthly basis since January 2022 when the Board moved from medium to high risk.

#### **Next Steps**

Staff will continue to submit monthly interim reports based on existing Ministry templates. In keeping with past practice, a comprehensive review of actual results will be compiled at the mid-year mark and will be brought to the Board of Trustees in April 2023. This report has two functions: to facilitate any budget reallocations necessary to prevent deterioration of the Board's financial position; and, to inform the budget process for potential risks and opportunities. In addition, as part of the regular budget cycle, staff will review its cost and revenue structures with a focus on a balanced budget and opportunities to replenish its accumulated surplus.
