Director Barill provided the following report:

#### **Mental Health**

- Last week we held the first session in a series titled Mental Health and Well-Being Series: For Parents, Guardians and Caregivers.
   Throughout this virtual series, community partners and Durham Catholic staff will explore various topics related to mental health and well-being. The next session will take place tomorrow evening at 6:00 p.m., and is titled *Life Promotion/Suicide Prevention Prepare, Prevent, Respond*, presented by DCDSB Student Services Staff. Thank you to our staff and community partners for their efforts to create awareness, supports and resources on these important topics.

#### **Upcoming Initiatives**

- Grade 12 students who registered for the Diplôme d'études langue française (DELF) Exam, are writing their exams this week. We have 180 students writing the DELF exam, which is an internationally recognized assessment of French proficiency. We want to extend our best wishes to students who are writing the DELF exam, and thank the 25 staff members who have been certified as examinateurs-correcteurs and are administering the exams.
- An additional virtual public meeting for the Oshawa Program and Boundary Study has been scheduled, to present the final options under consideration and to offer our parents, guardians, and caregivers the opportunity to ask questions and provide input. This is in addition to the previous in-person public meetings that have already taken place. This virtual session will take place via Zoom

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Webinar on Thursday, May 4 at 7:00 p.m. In addition, we have shared new videos and supporting materials that have been created to summarize the previous public meeting information and to show the potential implications for each school in Oshawa for the boundary and program study. #### Catholic Education Week and Mental Health Week

- April 30 May 5 is Catholic Education Week which recognizes the important contributions of Catholic education to our community, the province and Canada. The theme of this year's Catholic Education Week is We Are Many, We Are One.
- This week is also nationally designated as Mental Health Week, which is important as we aim to raise awareness and to promote and protect mental health. This year's Mental Health Week theme is My Story. The Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) says "Collectively and individually, we have multiple layers and stories that make us who we are and while each year 1 in 5 Canadians experience a mental illness or mental health issue, 5 in 5 of us that's all people have mental health."

#### Tuesday, May 2, 2023:

- Suicide Prevention and Life Promotion Literacy for School Staff training is being offered to educators. This is a 3-hour workshop developed by School Mental Health Ontario that is intended to develop an understanding of suicide prevention at school and the role that all school staff play in keeping students safe.
- Parent, Guardian and Caregiver Mental Health and Well-Being Virtual Presentation: Understanding Mood and Anxiety Difficulties Presented by Ontario Shores. The presentation will take place from 6:00 p.m. 7:00 p.m. on Zoom. Please click here to join the Zoom meeting.

#### Wednesday, May 3, 2023:

During this session, educators will review this series of lessons for students in Grades 9-12 on basic mental health knowledge and help-seeking skills, consider how to bring the lessons to their students, hear from those who have begun doing so, and start the planning process in conversation with their peers.

#### **Indigenous Education Updates:**

- May 5 is the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls & 2-Spirit People. Students have been engaging in learning about how systemic barriers failed to prevent and address cases of missing and murdered Indigenous women, children and 2SLGBTQ+ individuals. We encourage our community to learn more at Reclaiming Power and Place: The Final Report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. On May 5, secondary students from St Mary Catholic Secondary School will be attending the Gathering to Honour Missing and Murdered Indigenous Peoples hosted by Carea Community Health Centre. Staff will be attending the Gathering and selling sweaters to donate all the proceeds back to the Carea Community Health Centre to support the ongoing crisis of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Peoples in Canada.
- On May 11, elementary students from the Indigenous Student Circle
  will be planting a garden at the Catholic Education Centre. Students
  have previously met to discuss which plants they would like to
  include in the garden and will be planting these in May. Many of the
  students are also involved in the Student Indigenous Circle mural
  project that the gardens stand adjacent to.
- Grade 6-12 students are invited to join the Indigenous Student
  Circle for the 2023-2024 school year. The Indigenous Student Circle
  (ISC) is an opportunity for DCDSB Indigenous students to share
  their voices, learn together and connect with each other, Indigenous
  community partners and local Indigenous organizations. Please

#### Recognition

- On April 18, the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee hosted the Distinguished Catholic Volunteer Awards, which took place during National Volunteer Week. Congratulations to all the award recipients who were recognized for their commitment to our Catholic schools. Your passion and time are greatly appreciated by students and staff. I also want to extend my gratitude to the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC) for organizing the event, and for your ongoing efforts to engage with DCDSB families by providing support on a system-wide basis and promoting the Home-School-Parish relationship.
- On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I would like to recognize two of our secondary schools who placed in the top 25 schools who fundraised for the Terry Fox Foundation run. #### Appendix 2

#### **Notice of Motion – Amendments to By-Laws**

#### Rationale

Article 13.1 (a), (b) of General Working By-Law Number 2021 - Amendments to By-Laws

#### 13.1 Amendment with Notice

By-laws of the Board may be amended from time to time by Resolution of the Board, provided that:

- (a) A written notice of motion proposing the amendment shall have been given at a previous regular meeting; and

At any time, the By-laws may be amended without notice upon the unanimous vote of all Trustees.

#### 9.1 Notice of Motion

A Trustee may give the Secretary written notice of a motion, along with explanatory rationale, regarding any matter with respect to which the Trustee has a right to vote, and the motion shall be included in the Board agenda, provided it is received by the Secretary by no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Tuesday before the meeting at which it will appear on the agenda.

A notice of motion so received may not be the subject of debate or resolution until a Board meeting following the meeting at which it first appears on the agenda.

Notwithstanding the above, a Trustee may bring a motion at a Board meeting without prior notice provided that a two-thirds majority of those present and eligible to vote waive the notice requirements.

Matters not requiring a decision by the Board, including minutes from Committee meetings, may be distributed to Trustees at any time, and where received by Trustees prior to the start of a Board meeting may be the subject of discussion but not resolution.

#### 9.2 Trustee Questions

All agendas for Regular and In Camera sessions of the Board will include an item for Trustees to bring forward inquiries of interest to all Trustees and in the interest of the school System. Trustees will endeavour to provide advance notice to the Chair of the Board and the Director of Education of questions they wish to bring forward.

Matters not requiring a decision by the Board, including minutes from Committee meetings, may be distributed to Trustees at any time, and where received by Trustees prior to the start of a Board meeting may be the subject of discussion but not resolution.

#### 9.3 Reconsideration

Any matter which has been decided upon by the Board shall not be reconsidered by the Board during the subsequent twelve (12) month period unless approved for reconsideration by two thirds majority of those present and eligible to vote.

#### **Purpose**

This report is intended to provide a brief overview of strategies to incorporate equity into the classroom and review ongoing initiatives in the Durham Catholic District School Board (DCDSB).

#### **Background**

DCDSB is committed to addressing systemic discrimination and helping to break down barriers for Indigenous, Black, and racialized students, students from low-income households, and students with disabilities and other students with special education needs so that everyone has an equal opportunity to succeed, thrive, and reach their full potential<sup>1</sup>.

An essential part of this commitment is actively promoting equity in the classroom to help remove barriers so all of students can succeed. The Instructional Core, as defined by Richard Elmore, is composed of a **teacher** and **student** in the presence of **content**. The Instructional Core must be at the center of any equity efforts a board undertakes. In order for equity initiatives to have true impact, the student, teacher and curriculum must be transformed.

Historically, schools have planned for the average student, today we recognize that each student comes with their own unique biases, traumas, identities, experiences, assumptions, and backgrounds. Equity work involves recognizing the diversity of our students and shifting our focus to the margins.

Universal Design for Learning (UDL), Differentiated Instruction and Culturally Responsive and Relevant Pedagogy (CRRP) are three frameworks that support equity in the classroom.

UDL - A teaching approach that focuses on using teaching strategies or pedagogical materials designed to meet special needs to enhance learning for all students, regardless of age, skills, or situation. Learning For All 2013

Differentiated Instruction - Differentiation is an organized yet flexible way of proactively adjusting teaching and learning to meet kids where they are and help them to achieve maximum growth as learners. Carol Ann Tomlinson, 1999

CRRP - Teaching that recognizes that **all students** learn differently and that these differences may be connected to background, language, family structure, and social or cultural identity.

The attached presentation expands on the ideas above, shares practical strategies to incorporate equity into the classroom and reviews ongoing literacy, numeracy, and destreaming initiatives in DCDSB.

As a Catholic school board, equity and inclusion are concepts rooted in our faith. Our core belief that all persons are created in God's image and our call to honour the dignity of each person animates all equity initiatives as we strive to live out our mission to be "an inclusive Catholic learning community that inspires every student to achieve their full potential through faith and education."

# Why De-Streaming

 In Ontario, Academic and Applied course types or "streams" have been in place for decades. The original intention behind Applied courses was to provide a different pedagogical approach to learning. However, over time, the Applied course type has become perceived as less academically rigorous. Data shows that the students most likely to be streamed into this course type are students who are Indigenous, Black, from low-income households, and/or have disabilities or other special education needs. Students in the Applied course type stream are limited in the courses they can take in later grades, which in turn limits their access to postsecondary pathways.

M. Hammond walked the Committee through the Second Quarter Report comparing anticipated results versus actual year to date results. Ms. Hammond noted that there is an increase in partnership revenue and interest revenue resulting from higher interest rates and a positive cash balance throughout the first six months of the year. This additional revenue will be utilized to address cost pressures noted in supply costs, worker's compensation costs and increased utility costs, specifically gas prices. In addition to the increased revenue, there are savings noted in staff vacancies and student transportation that will be used to offset the noted cost pressures. The mid year results suggest that there will be no change in the projected provision to reserve balance as presented in the 22/23 Revised Estimates report.

- M. Hall inquired why the Board was experiencing higher WSIB costs and M. Hammond noted an increase in claims where slips, trips, and falls have resulted in concussions as well as an increase in mental health claims.
- M. Ste. Marie asked why there was a negative variance on the trustee expense line and Ms. Hammond advised that this resulted from a timing issue whereby the trustee memberships have all been paid for the year. No pressure has been identified in trustee expenditures.
- M. Forster asked if the delayed ministry funding announcement would impact staff redundancy declarations. T. Barill and M. Hammond confirmed that due to the number of retirements and the anticipated enrolment levels for next year, there would be no redundancy notifications necessary.

### 4.2. Presentation

4.2.1. Budget Process and Consultation Update

Marie Hammond provided an overview of where the Board is in the Budget Process and noted that the delay in ministry grant announcements will necessitate moving the May Finance Committee meeting to May 29, 2023 from May 15, 2023. This deferral will allow staff sufficient time to review and incorporate the impacts of the Grants for Student Needs (GSN) and Priority and Parterships Funding (PPF) announcements into the draft budget.

### 5. Other Business

### 5.1 Ministry Grant Announcement

Ms. Hammond provided a high level overview of the ministry funding annoucements that came out earlier in the day on April 17, 2023. The PPF funding is still outstanding, but staff received the GSN and Capital funding memos. The new funding formula for transportation was announced and incorporated into the 23/24 funding announcements. Upon initial review, it appears the new formula will result in an increase in transportation revenue for the Durham Catholic District School Board (DCDSB) which will assist in supporting the new contracts with the operators.

The ministry announced funding for administration expenses related to Remote Learning. Boards may continue to operate virtual schools and will be funded for school administration based on enrolment each year. Durham Catholic has approximately 60 students registered for virtual learning in 23/24 which will generate very little school administration funding.

The ministry has realigned Indigenous Education grants. Total provincial funding remains unchanged; however, per pupil funding for Indigenous Education courses has been significantly reduced and teachers for these courses will now be funded through a combination of the Pupil Foundation Grants and Indigenous Education Grants. Funding has been redirected to a Supplemental Indigenous Grant that will be provided to all Boards to fund provincial priorities. There is a one time realignment grant for Boards that will lose funding as a result of the change which includes DCDSB.

The GSNs include increases for wages and benefits that have been negoiated at the central bargaining table. The Covid-19 learning recovery fund has been eliminated.

### **Project SEARCH Update**

The Skills Assessment and Interview Day were held on April 26th. Eighteen applicants went through a two-hour session with six 15-minute stations. One station had applicants engage in an interview with three people (one from each partner, DCDSB, Abilities Centre and The Region of Durham). Five other stations mimicked skills needed in various internships during the Project SEARCH year.

On May 1st, letters were sent to the ten successful applicants. Priority was given to applicants going into their final year of high school for 2023-24 who otherwise would not have an opportunity to apply to Project SEARCH again.

May 8th was Signing Day. The ten applicants (interns) came to the Catholic Education Centre to sign the Project SEARCH contract. An information package and a Project SEARCH hoodie were provided to each intern to start their journey. Intern parents/guardians/caregivers were also invited to share in the Signing Day. Photographs were taken with the intern, family, and all partners to mark the occasion.

All unsuccessful applicants were invited to register with the Abilities Centre to explore skill development programs. Information Night is on Thursday, June 8, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. for all unsuccessful applicants and their families.

### Mental Health Report provided by Shelley Phoenix on behalf of Dr. Michaela Evans

On May 1st, the Suicide Prevention/Life Promotion Workshop was run for two groups of educators. This training was designed for boards by School Mental Health Ontario, and the DCDSB was the first board in the province to offer this training and will provide feedback to SMHO.

May 1-5 was Catholic Education and Mental Health Week. Schools participated in daily announcements and in-class activities. Various schools hosted larger events (i.e. Therapy dog visits at DO'C), and some schools chose to focus on Catholic Education Weed last week and focus on Mental Health on an alternative week.

The Mental Health and Well-Being Parent, Guardian and Caregiver Mental Health Series will continue as follows:

- April 18th- Youth Engagement Youth and Substance Use, presented by Pinewood of Lakeridge of Health
- April 25th: Life Promotion/Suicide Prevention Prepare, Prevent and Respond, presented by DCDSB Student Services Staff
- May 2nd: Understanding Mood and Anxiety Difficulties, presented by Ontario Shores
- May 9th: Game-bling When Gaming meets Gambling, presented by the YMCA's Youth Gambling Awareness Program
- May 16th: The Intersection of Equity and Mental Health, presented by the Black Health Alliance.

### **Superintendent's Report**

Program Support Teacher (PST) Meetings were held today with a focus on Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and best practices, Early Intervention Classrooms (EIC) updates, and the referral process. The meeting also included a presentation from a team of Literacy Consultants from Academic Services and a Student Services Speech-Language Pathologist who focused on Reading screeners and the importance of using reading screeners in elementary and secondary.

In April, Student Services provided an in-depth presentation to Trustees about the vast support that the Department provides students with special education needs.

The PPM 149 – Community Partnerships Meeting was held on April 25th to review the community partnerships.

The Student Services Staff Meeting focused on Restorative Practices.

Special Education Team Meeting, which included the Durham Catholic Autism Resource Team (DCART) and the Durham Catholic Behaviour Resource Team (DCBRT), was centered on Best practices and future planning.

### 2.6. Association Reports

### **Grandview Kids- Claudia Nosseir**

On March 29, 2022, the Ontario government announced the creation of 22 SmartStart Hubs across the province to connect families with child development services in their local communities. SmartStart Hubs act as a clear point of entry to child development services for parents and caregivers who have concerns about their child's development. Grandview Kids was selected as the SmartStart Hub in Durham Region.

SmartStart Hubs are to be considered the "front door" to child development services. Families will be warmly greeted and will have a conversation with a professional about their concerns, their child's development and strengths, and any support that might be needed.

In some cases, the agency that is the SmartStart Hub will be able to offer services and programs; depending on what is recommended, the SmartStart Hub might also provide a supportive connection to families with our partners in the area that can provide services.

Families won't need to tell their story twice because the SmartStart Hubs works directly with agencies in your community, potentially improving the timeliness of service initiation with our community partner.

Who can access the SmartStart Hub?

- Anyone with a concern about their child's development can contact the SmartStart Hub to start the process of assessment.
- Children living in Ontario aged zero (birth) to 19, or up to age 21 if they are in school, may be eligible for SmartStart Hubs.
- No diagnosis or referral is required for SmartStart Hubs.
- There is no cost to clients or caregivers for SmartStart Hub referrals or assessments.

How do I access the Grandview Kids SmartStart Hub?

 Families who have general concerns about their child's development can access our SmartStart Hub and fill out the selfreferral form.

### **Purpose**

To provide the Board of Trustees an overview of the Ministry of Education's funding announcements for the 2023/2024 school year.

### Background

On April 17, 2023, the Ministry of Education released the Grants for Student Needs (GSN), Capital Funding, and the Priorities and Partnerships Funding (PPF) for 2023/2024.

Staff has prepared the following summary to outline the significant funding changes.

### **Grants for Student Needs (GSN)**

### **COVID-19 Learning Recovery Fund**

Introduced in 2022/2023, Covid-19 Learning Recovery Funds provided funding for additional staffing to address continued pandemic related issues. This funding has been eliminated in 2023/2024. This is a reduction in funding for the Durham Catholic District School Board (DCDSB) in the amount of \$3,330,982. These funds had been used in the following areas:

- Remote learning (teachers, administration, information technology supports);
- Special education supports (educational assistants, professional staff);
- · Supply staff; and
- Enhanced cleaning.

### **Student Transportation Reform**

The Ministry is implementing a new Student Transportation Grant funding framework. The new framework is intended to be more transparent, equitable and focused on reliability. There will be enhanced reporting and accountability requirements to allow the ministry to track how certain components within the funding model are being utilized. The new framework reflects the following:

- Number of students deemed eligible based on common home-to-school distance thresholds applied to all school boards;
- Determining the optimal number of school-bus routes needed as well as leveraging use of public transit where services are available; and
- Establishing transparent benchmarks that are intended to represent the cost of services such as
  - Annual cost of purchasing and operating school buses;
  - Continuing to reflect changes in market prices of fuel (fuel escalator/deescalator);
  - Setting compensation benchmarks for school bus drivers; and
  - Including a provision for spare driver capacity.

Driver retention and recruitment bonuses previously funded directly by the ministry to school bus operators have now been moved to the Student Transportation Grant and the funds will flow through school boards.

The impact of actual costs and routing information on in-year and future grants is not fully discernible at this time.

The estimated grant impact for 2023/2024 is an additional \$1M in revenue. This revenue will be utilized to offset additional costs included in recently negotiated operator contracts and costs downloaded from the ministry.

### **Remote Learning**

Funding will be provided for remote learning administration (i.e., Principals, Vice-Principals, school office, information technology) based on virtual school enrolment. Remote learning enrolment will be excluded from the calculations for in-school administration and school facility-based calculations. DCDSB has a low virtual enrolment resulting in a minimum grant impact.

### Safe and Clean Schools Supplement

A new grant within the GSN, the Safe and Clean Schools Supplement is intended to provide funding for staff in the following areas:

- Professional/Paraprofessional staff such as psychologists, social workers, and child/youth workers;
- Educational Assistants; and
- Custodial/Maintenance.

The grant for DCDSB for 2023/2024 will be \$247,601.

#### **Indigenous Education Funding Realignment**

The funding for First Nations, Metis and Inuit Studies courses is being revised as part of the realignment within the Indigenous Education Grant. Funding for teachers in these courses will now be pro-rated between the Pupil Foundation Grant and the Indigenous Education grant. Class sizes between 8 and 23 will be funded through both grants proportionately and classes with 23 or more students will be solely funded through the Pupil Foundation Grant. Previously, the Indigenous Education Grant covered the entire cost of teachers for these courses.

School boards are required to deliver courses where a minimum of eight students are enrolled.

One-time transition funding is being provided to boards that will experience a reduction in funding due to the realignment. Funding is intended to support existing programming. The DCDSB has been allotted \$367,679 as a one-time grant.

The funding realignment includes a new supplemental amount under the Board Action Plan (BAP) that is intended to support provincial Indigenous education priorities.

Overall, the funding realignment reduces funding for DCDSB by approximately \$750,000 after the one-time transition funding is discontinued.

Indigenous Education funding continues to be enveloped.

## **Keeping up with Costs**

The Ministry will provide a 2% increase to school operations non-staffing funding benchmarks to assist school boards in managing increases in commodity prices such as electricity, natural gas, and insurance. There is also continued support for the optimization of ventilation in schools.

#### **Secondary E-learning Funding Adjustments**

The funding for secondary class size will be reduced to reflect e-learning courses funded at 30 students to 1 teacher vs 23 to 1 for regular classroom teachers. The Ministry assumes 22.5% (2022/2023 – 15%) of secondary students will take one e-learning course during the 2023/2024 school year.

#### **Salary and Benefit Increases**

Benchmarks have been updated to reflect the provisions of the recently ratified central agreements for the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE).

## **Capital Funding**

Capital funding for 2023/2024 remains consistent with previous years and is estimated to be as follows:

School Condition Improvement	\$5,297,165
School Renewal	\$3,219,467
Capital Capacity	\$38,514
Temporary accommodation	\$543,258

The ministry is introducing time limits on school condition improvement funds and school renewal funding allocations. Funds may be carried over but will expire after 2.5 years. Therefore, 2023/2024 allocations will expire if unspent March 31, 2026.

## **Priorities and Partnerships Funding (PPF)**

The Ministry has announced the following PPF funding which focuses on their priorities of learning and well-being to support students for success now and in the future.

DCDSB will experience a significant decrease in funding through the elimination of the Covid-19 Learning Recovery Fund and the Indigenous Education Funding Realignment. In addition, the ministry has not kept up with all inflationary increases, sick leave realities or changes in statutory and other benefit obligations. These gaps in funding have created further budget challenges for the Board.

Senior administration is currently looking at system realignment that maximizes student support while maintaining a balanced budget. Staff will bring updates to the Board of Trustees throughout the budget process.

## **Notice of Motion – Board Advisory Groups**

WHEREAS the Memorandum to Trustees on the subject of Board Advisory groups highlights the benefits of Trustee representation and inclusion on important system-wide non-Ministry mandated advisory groups.

WHEREAS such benefits include precedent among various Catholic School Boards for Trustee representation to non-Ministry mandated advisory committees.

WHEREAS Trustee representation to these groups has been established as best practice for building respectful relationships, fostering trust, and enhancing communication with equity-deserving groups.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT staff initiate discussions with group members of the Indigenous Education Circle, the Anti-Black Racism and Black Excellence Committee, and the 2SLGBTQ+ Advisory Committee to facilitate potential Trustee representation to these groups and report back to the Board of Trustees no later than the June 19, 2023, Board meeting.

## **Notice of Motion – Amendments to By-Laws**

#### Rationale

Article 13.1 (a), (b) of General Working By-Law Number 2021 - Amendments to By-Laws

#### 13.1 Amendment with Notice

By-laws of the Board may be amended from time to time by Resolution of the Board, provided that:

- (a) A written notice of motion proposing the amendment shall have been given at a previous regular meeting; and
- (b) The text and a brief statement of intended purpose of the amendment shall have been included in the notice of motion forming part of the agenda for the meeting at which the amendment is considered by the Board.

#### 13.2 Amendment without Notice

At any time, the By-laws may be amended without notice upon the unanimous vote of all Trustees.

#### **MOTION**

"THAT the DCDSB approve the following amendments to General Working By-law 2021:

#### 9.1 Notice of Motion

A Trustee may give the Secretary written notice of a motion, along with explanatory rationale, regarding any matter with respect to which the Trustee has a right to vote, and the motion shall be included in the Board agenda, provided it is received by the Secretary by no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Tuesday before the meeting at which it will appear on the agenda.

A notice of motion so received may not be the subject of debate or resolution until a Board meeting following the meeting at which it first appears on the agenda.

Notwithstanding the above, a Trustee may bring a motion at a Board meeting without prior notice provided that a two-thirds majority of those present and eligible to vote waive the notice requirements.

Matters not requiring a decision by the Board, including minutes from Committee meetings, may be distributed to Trustees at any time, and where received by Trustees prior to the start of a Board meeting may be the subject of discussion but not resolution.

#### 9.2 Trustee Questions

All agendas for Regular and In Camera sessions of the Board will include an item for Trustees to bring forward inquiries of interest to all Trustees and in the interest of the school System. Trustees will endeavour to provide advance notice to the Chair of the Board and the Director of Education of questions they wish to bring forward.

Matters not requiring a decision by the Board, including minutes from Committee meetings, may be distributed to Trustees at any time, and where received by Trustees prior to the start of a Board meeting may be the subject of discussion but not resolution.

#### 9.3 Reconsideration

Any matter which has been decided upon by the Board shall not be reconsidered by the Board during the subsequent twelve (12) month period unless approved for reconsideration by two thirds majority of those present and eligible to vote.

#### Rationale

Project SEARCH is an internationally successful 10-month transition-to-work program for young people with developmental or intellectual disabilities. During their final year of high school, students are fully immersed with a host business, gaining employment skills through a combination of classroom instruction and hands-on career training. The attached document provides a brief overview of the program. More information about Project SEARCH in Canada can be found on their website – <u>direct link</u>.

In September 2021, DCDSB signed a Transfer Payment Agreement (TPA), Developmental Disabilities Pilot – Student Transitions, to explore the possibility of running Project SEARCH in our board. To date, extensive research and steps have been taken to understand the goals and structure of the program, and to secure business partners. The Ministry of Education provided an extension for a September 2023 start date. Part of the funding can be used for professional development and training, including attending an annual Project SEARCH Conference.

This year's conference is taking place from July 10-14, 2023, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Two staff members from the Student Services Department, who are leading this project, have expressed an interest in attending. The conference would provide an excellent opportunity for networking and better understanding of how the program runs and the

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resources that are available. All partners (Abilities Centre and The Regional Municipality of Durham) working with DCDSB to facilitate Project SEARCH will be sending staff members to the conference.
